"ADAPTING ALLIANCES, PARTNERSHIPS, AND SECURITY ARCHITECTURE" FEBRUARY 6-10, 2023 HONOLULU, HAWAII

Background

<u>What</u>: To explore innovative mechanisms and potential paths forward for the United States, allies, partners and regional organizations to collectively address major concerns and security challenges, adapting to the changing security landscape while affirming a rules-based international order.

<u>Why</u>: Much has changed since the region's security architecture and alliance structure was forged in the first two decades after World War II ended. The conditions and context during the inception of these arrangements differ markedly from today's geopolitical circumstances. If the regional security architecture and the U.S. alliance system are to constitute a relevant pillar for regional stability as well as a conflict deterrent, they will need to undergo some adjustments to reflect new strategic realities and the legitimate shared interests of the allies in the 21st century. Therefore, it is important to:

- Identify the major security challenges on the national, sub-regional, and regional levels;
- Determine the gaps and concerns of the region's military alliances and partnerships in addressing current and anticipated security challenges;
- Generate ideas on how to adapt alliances and partnerships to the new realities of the 2020s, including innovating on cooperative mechanisms to address the identified gaps and challenges; and
- Develop follow-on courses of action that operationalize new ideas for modernizing alliances, partnerships, and the regional security architecture.

Intended Outcomes

- Assessment of the evolving strategic environment in the 21st century focusing on the major tensions and security challenges that define the Indo-Pacific region.
- Proposals for cooperative constructs that can best address these tensions and challenges.
- Compendium of regional perspectives on "integrated deterrence" and its utility to frame the modernization of alliances, partnerships, and security architecture.
- Provide insights to the upcoming workshop, "Maluhia 2023: Promoting a Collaborative Policy Environment", on policy gaps that inhibit collaborative opportunities for integrating deterrence.
- Plans and initiatives for post-workshop courses of action.

Methodology

The workshop will utilize various facilitation and engagement tools to ensure maximum participation of the participants in all the workshop activities. Plenary overviews, polling surveys and topical lectures will be complemented by follow on discussions, with participants grouped in various ways to optimize the circulation of subject matter experts and diverse ideas. The workshop will also use the daily lunch as occasion for participants to network and generate ideas for collaboration.
