








THE COLLAPSE OF THE SOVIET UNION







- Putin's Perspective

- Tools of Foreign Policy
 - Information operations
 - The "image of stability"
 - Increasing use of the military



SUMMARY: RUSSIA'S FOREIGN POLICY AND WORLDVIEW

- Self-Perception: Russia is a Great Power
- Centralized Decision-making
 - Small group of key leaders involved
 - Public opinion does matter (within limits!)
- Resource Limitations are Known
- "Gerasimov Doctrine"
 - Constant state of conflict (no "peace or war")
 - Use all means available
- Willing to Take Risks: Actions Abroad Have Consequences at Home


- Cooperation or Competition?
 - European security
 - Engaging China
- Ignoring Russia
 - No real economic ties
 - A "regional power" that is weak
- Periods of "Reset" with Russia
- Trump's Admiration of Putin
- Biden Breaks the Cycle of U.S. Leadership on Russia? [No Reset?]

- Bilateral Tensions
- Security Cooperation
 - Arms sales
 - Intelligence sharing
- Shared Concerns
 - Transnational threats
 - The U.S. as a rival
- An Alliance, Strategic Partnership, or Marriage of Convenience?







THE JCPOA AND A "NUCLEAR IRAN"

- Russia's <u>Official Position</u> on Iranian Nuclear Energy
 - Assistance with the Bushehr nuclear facility
 - Opposed to Iranian possession of nuclear weapons
- Perceived Value of the JCPOA
 - The United Nations
 - U.S. withdrawal in 2018
 - Enhance Russia's role?




CASE STUDY 2: RUSSIA AND SYRIA

- Support for Assad
 - "Helping a friend"
 - Russia as a regional actor
- Low-cost/High-return
 - Combat experience
 - Refining roles of mercenaries
 - Arms sales
- Limiting the U.S. in the Middle East
- This Is Part of a Broader Russian Security Policy





STRATEGIC POWER COMPETITION: REALITY

- Interaction among the Three Powers
 - Interests and capacity vary
 - Be mindful of wishful thinking
- Regional Actors and Agency
 - Regions are distinct priorities for outside powers
 - Understand <u>local</u> interests and capacity
