**LADSCA participants are prepared to:**

- 1) Develop and improve on national legal authorities for use of the military in support of civil authorities.**
- 2) Conduct military operations in support of civil authorities in accordance with international law standards.**

**Background:** The three-week Legal Aspects of Defense Support of Civil Authorities (LADSCA) (MASL P176042) course promoted defense support of civil authorities (DSCA) that is consistent with democratic rule of law, protection of human rights and reasonable use of force. LADSCA participants learned about the U.S. approach to DSCA and compared their national approach with the approaches taken by the U.S. and other countries.

Basic principles from international law were applied to a variety of operational settings including internal armed conflict, narcotics trafficking, border security, cyber-attacks, natural disasters, pandemic and mass casualty events, domestic terrorism, special events security and detention operations. The advantage of interagency cooperation and clear legal authorities were emphasized throughout the course. A comprehensive exercise involving response to a pandemic engaged the participants in all of the legal issues associated with the legal aspects of defense support of civil authorities.

Select participants presented case studies to the class on the use of the military assistance to civil authorities in their countries.

The Legal Aspects of Defense Support to Civil Authorities 19010 course presented the Vincent Sowa Award to Major Mahmoud Magdy Mounir Hassan Farag from Egypt. The Sowa Award honors the memory of Lt Col Vincent Sowa from Sierra Leone. Lieutenant Colonel Sowa was a graduate of the inaugural LADSCA course in 2014 who went on to be guest instructor for the 2016 course when he shared his experience as a peacekeeping mission legal advisor and as an advisor during the West Africa Ebola outbreak. He died in 2017 during floods in Sierra Leone.

In keeping with course objectives, LADSCA participants visited New York City, where they received briefings by various United Nations, federal, state and local subject matter experts regarding many of the topics discussed above. The video-based Firearms Training Simulator (FATS) training provided participants with practical experience with use of force legal issues. In accordance with IMET objectives, participants also took part in cultural familiarization activities in Newport, RI; Boston; MA, and New York City as part of the DIILS Field Studies Program. The visit to New York featured a guided tour of historical and cultural sites, such as the 9-11 Memorial, South Street Seaport and the Flat Iron District. These visits helped the participants understand the U.S. and global free-market institutions within the context of a diverse society.
